New Business

CPR / AED CLASS. At the June 11 meeting, Mike Leibovitz WA9EVF will teach our CPR and AED update class. The practicum will use two CPR adult manikins and an AED simulator. To qualify for certification, each student must train on this equipment. For SRO members, reservations for the classes are \$30. This fee includes the training, exam and wallet card and a color CPR manual.

CPR / AED UPDATE from the SRO board meeting on Wednesday, April 30: The club will hold its CPR and AED class practicum (lab session) at the June meeting. A review session will take place the following month at a special July meeting. Afterward, Mike will administer the Red Cross written exam. BLEEDING HEART VIRUS. Mike Leibovitz speaks briefly about the Bleeding Heart virus problem. The virus exploits a hole in an open-source secure sockets layer (SSL) security system. Many online services use this software for user authentication during sign-on (password and challenge). Hackers can exploit the bug, break into such sites and steal data. The bug affects banks and other business sites. All logins are at risk. Passwords are available. Users should check their Google, Facebook, Amazon and other accounts. Periodically changing passwords is prudent.

XP BECOMES INSECURE. As of April 8, Microsoft no longer provides Windows XP security updates. To avoid virus and Trojan attacks, a Windows user should upgrade to version 7 or 8. Microsoft has just released a Windows 8 upgrade.

PROBLEM WITH XP MODE. Some people run Windows XP mode on Windows 7. Yet Microsoft cautions that this mode is *also unprotected!*










Silent Key Stan Garstka W9LG

Saturn shines brightest in May

On May 10, at 2 p.m. EDT, Saturn reaches opposition - the point in its orbit when it lies opposite the Sun as seen from Earth. The planet then appears as a bright yellowish object at magnitude 0.1 in the constellation Libra the Scales. In the Northern Hemisphere, that star pattern rises in the southeast at sunset. As you might guess, opposition means the planet rises at sunset, climbs highest in the south around 1 a.m. local daylight time, and sets as the Sun comes up. Opposition also brings Saturn closest to Earth, so it shines brightest for the year (at magnitude 0.1). During times of good seeing (atmospheric steadiness), an observer can pick out the more prominent features of the globe and rings through a 3-inch telescope.



Repeater Etiquette

- If you have questions about the use of the repeaters, please ask. FCC Part 97 rules apply AT ALL TIMES.
- Listen for at least 10 seconds before transmitting to be sure the repeater is not already in use or ask "Is the repeater in use?".
- The repeater does not have a timer. However, long transmissions are not recommended. Keep them short one to two minutes at the longest. Give someone a chance to check in or respond to what you said. WAIT for the repeater to drop before transmitting.
- If you wish to join a conversation in progress, wait until the end of a transmission and give your call sign promptly. There is a short delay between the end of a transmission and the repeater drop. Stations already in conversation wait for the repeater to drop before transmitting.
- If you need access to the repeater for an emergency transmission, say "EMERGENCY" and give your call sign when you break into an ongoing conversation.
- Do not use "break" or "break break" since they have special meaning for most operators and usage varies around the U.S. Use "EMERGENCY" or your call sign.
- Always allow a breaking station to transmit immediately. Allow a station an opportunity to report emergencies or ask for directions or other assistance. This is particularly important during commuting periods and periods of bad weather when the need for emergency assistance calls are most likely.
- Avoid business talk (FCC Part 97 rules). When in doubt, DON'T.
- Remember Amateur frequencies are not private lines what you say on the repeater can and will be heard by many people (including the FCC). Always assume you have an audience.
- Do not say things that may offend others who may be listening. Be circumspect in discussing private personal family affairs on the repeater. Do not "advertise" your house will be unoccupied during vacations, etc.
- The repeater gives its own ID. You must also identify your station by giving your call sign every 10 minutes during a conversation and at the end of your participation. You do not have to identify the other stations nor do you have to identify yourself with every transmission.
- Monitor the repeater. Members or visitors may call for assistance. Visitors may just want a friendly conversation on the way through the Chicago area.
- If you hear what you believe to be deliberate interference, do not attempt to communicate with the interfering station. Switch to the repeater input frequency and, if you can hear the signal, record the following information for use in locating the source:
- 1. signal strength
- 2. your location
- 3. date and time
- 4. your antenna and receiver
- 5. and characteristics of the RF, audio or voice that might help in identification
- 6. direction if it an be determined

Report the information to a member of the Board of Directors or the Club Officers.

- Do not discuss interference incidents on the air.
- While the repeater pairs are exclusive in this area, there may be times when other repeaters may be heard. Propagation conditions are occasionally such that we will hear output signals from other repeaters. The input signals from stations in other repeater service areas will sometimes bring up our repeater. Our use of the minimum power necessary to access our repeater will help minimize interference with our neighbors. Be tolerant of the annoyances resulting from these unusual conditions.

Brain Regeneration May Help Alzheimer's Patients

Regeneration of brain or spinal cord tissue might be possible. Gong Chen, biology professor at Penn State, is leading a research team to develop a method of brain repair. The goal of this research is to regenerate damaged brain neurons by reprogramming glial cells. The process might be useful in patient recovery after an accident or a degenerative brain disease such as Alzheimer's.

After a brain injury, reactive glial cells move to the site. These unique cells protect the site from bacteria and toxins. Unfortunately in the normal healing process, the glial cells form a glial scar. This scar can block neurons from linking to the injured area.


Dr. Chen's research reprograms the glial scar tissue so that it acts as new neurons. Using a special retrovirus, Chen's team injected the protein NeuroD1 into glial cells. Normally this NeuroD1 protein develops nerve cells in the brain's hippocampus region. After the injection, two types of reactive glial cells responded and became neurons. The conversion process took one week. Each glial cell type became a different type of neuron.

In another test, Chen's team performed a similar test on the brain of a mouse with Alzheimer's disease. Glial cells in the diseased mouse's brain also became working neurons. The experimental mice were 14 months old, which is equivalent to 60 years for a human being.

A third experiment used cultured human glial cells. In this case, conversion of glial cells to functional neurons tookplace in three weeks.
